COMPREHENSIVE MEDICO-LEGAL APPROACH TO SEXUAL VIOLENCE

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Survivor-Centered Approach to Sexual Violence

Victim Reports to Police First

- The victim reports the incident to the police, receives a Police Form 3 (PF3), and may be referred to a health facility for medical attention.
- The police file a report, and the victim may receive a medical examination at the station or be referred to a hospital.

Seeks Medical Attention First

- The victim seeks medical attention at a health facility, receives treatment, care, and counseling, and may report the incident to the police.
- The health facility provides medical examination, evidence collection, and treatment, and may refer the victim to the police or legal services.

GENERAL KEY PRINCIPLES WHILE HANDLING SEXUAL VIOLENCE CASES

Respect of Autonomy

Provision of accurate information is needed and the right to make decisions for her/his case, including whether to report the case to police

Access to services

Any medical needs should be addressed immediately. Their care and support should be a priority

Right to Confidentiality

Make sure the immediate environment is secure and private and the victim's confidentiality is respected

Non-discrimination

There shouldn't be any discrimination, regardless of religion, race, sex, gender identity, age, ethnic group, profession, socioeconomic level, political affiliation, sexual orientation or other factor.

KEY POINTS IN MANAGING HEALTH ISSUES IN SEXUAL ASSAULT CASES

Informed Consent

Ensure victims are informed of every step of the medical process so they can consent to each part.

Managing Risks of Pregnancy

This might include baseline testing, emergency contraception and follow up

Management of other STIs

Offer Prophylaxis or treatment for Sexually Transmitted Infections.

Documentation

Ensure all injuries are documented and treated

HIV Testing and Prevention

Assess Risk, Baseline testing, provide PEP and subsequent reviews

Wound Care

Provide antibiotics and Tetanus Prophylaxis
